### Treasurer's Comments

November revenues were \$414K, \$5K over Budget due to \$2K higher resale fees, \$1K Lifestyle revenues, \$1K interest income, and \$1K of other miscellaneous income. Expenses were \$29K under Budget due to \$16K lower landscape expenses (normal monthly variances) and \$13K lower electricity costs (reversal of incorrect higher bills from previous months reversed in November). This resulted in monthly net of \$34K, \$34K over Budget for November and \$100K favorable YTD. A portion of this favorability will reverse in December as final bills come in, but our re-forecast for the year is now quite a bit above Budget.

Resale fees were \$2K over Budget in November with five home sales and \$11K over Budget on a YTD basis. So far there have been four resales in December month-to-date.

The Replacement reserve is now at \$1,309K, up \$92K from last month. This month's only expense item was \$2K for fitness equipment maintenance. It appears that a considerable portion of reserve expenses forecast for this year will be delayed into 2024. There was also \$6K of sprinkler repair expense running through the Villa reserve.

Compliance thoughts as we end 2023 and begin a new journey in 2024:

1st thought: **Oh gosh, ANOTHER letter from the guy in the red car?** 2nd thought: **This will be some great information, so let me read the rest of this article.... GREAT!** 

I'm glad that you decided to keep reading, Thank you! Thank you everyone for your warm welcome into this amazing community. Just a few words as we end 2023, and begin 2024:

 In my most recent drives I noticed that a lot of you have painted your mailboxes as I've been requesting, and they look FANTASTIC!!! We appreciate this effort and would like to say great job to everyone who stepped up to address this issue!! Also, we've noticed that excessive decorations have been removed. Again, thank you. With this being said please keep a few more things in mind:

2. Enjoy the holidays!- Remember that decorations can be put up as early as 30 days prior to the official date of the Holiday (e.g. Christmas is on December 25 every year. Christmas decorations can be hung starting November 25, but must be removed by the 15th day after the holiday, in this example, January 10).

3. Please limit yard decorations to a reasonable number- **After all, we don't want Santa to trip and fall** as he delivers gifts to your home

4. In December 2023 going into Spring 2024 power/pressure washing (**particularly the house siding**) will be a big focus. If you haven't power washed your home, please plan to do so in the new year.

5. Also, please make sure mailboxes are in good working order (door and flag), that the mailbox color isn't fading, or showing signs of rust. Z-box (www.zboxinc.com) is the only approved vendor for post replacements here at Carolina Preserve. To order a replacement please call Eric, the owner of Zbox, directly at (919) 280 7506. New posts take about 2 weeks for delivery. Individual components can be ordered separately. The box itself can be purchased at Home Depot or Lowes (Gibraltar "Elite Medium" or "Elite Standard"). Refer to 3.3.15 in the Design Guidelines. Just <u>Click</u> Here to review the guidelines.

6. If you don't have a street tree on your property, please make sure one is planted in line with the Design Guidelines.

A recommendation of the Go Green Task Force report is to provide useful information to residents. One way in which this is being done is through articles provided in the weekly Lifestyle Newsletter. A recent article provides information about recycling.

Although some have called recycling a "scam," further information suggests that characterization to be misinformed. Members of the Environmental Club recently toured the Wake County Recycling Center, and as a result have provided useful information regarding recycling. About 450 tons of refuse is delivered to the Center daily, of which 82% is reused. Only 18% ends up in landfill, a decrease of almost 370 tons. Most of the recycled materials are used by local businesses in the Carolinas and Virginia. Recycling also impacts other industries. Recycling steel saves 72% of the energy used to produce new steel. Water use is cut by 40% as well. Recycling aluminum uses about 5% of the energy needed to produce new metal. Recycling accounts for about 681,000 jobs in the US. Moreover, recycling compostable materials prevents them from being converted to methane in landfills.

The Town of Cary's website details what they will accept. As you unwrap Christmas gifts be mindful of recycling wrapping paper – especially the non-metallic types. And your live tree and other greenery can be collected during the yard waste pickup.

Remember to reduce, reuse, recycle.
